

Second grade students have been busy working hard, making new friends, establishing school rules/expectations, and learning many interesting things. These are some of the areas we've been focusing on during the first month of school:

#### Math

- Read and write 3-digit numbers
- Compare values of numbers (greater than, less than, equal to)
- Addition word problems
- Even and odd numbers

#### E.L.A. (English Language Arts)

- Read a variety of both fiction/non-fiction texts and identify the main idea with supporting details
- Strengthen reading fluency (be able to decode words quickly, accurately, and smoothly with expression/intonation)
- **Grammar**: Nouns, Root Words, Inflectional endings ~s, ~ed

#### Please remember to do the following things DAILY:

- 1) **READ** and **SIGN** your child's **PLANNER** to ensure he/she finished all assignments.
- 2) CHECK your child's HOMEWORK FOLDER for important forms and homework papers.
- 3) Reading Fluency Homework TIME your child while he/she reads for 1 MINUTE and count the number of words read correctly. Also ask and answer comprehension questions to check for understanding in the story/text.

# Fifth Grade September News Flash

18 days down and 24 more days to go until the end of 1st quarter. Students have been off and running to a great start.

Reading/Writing: Students are identifying and judging evidence that support ideas in Science & Social Studies Informational text. They are also learning to visualize concepts grasped from the process of reading complex text, summarizing main ideas with key details, and eliciting various text features to deepen their understanding. Coming to the classroom discussions prepared and engaging fully and thoughtfully with others is a non-negotiable expectation. Students will be composing an Opinion Letter to the Editor of a Kids' Science Magazine to address whether or not Pluto shall



be classified as a "dwarf planet". iReady Reading Diagnostic has completed and will be shared with students in order to set goals.

Mathematics: Students are building confidence with reading, writing, comparing, ordering, and rounding up to nine-digit numbers of whole numbers. Real-world problems will be explored where the order of the operations is clear from the context. iReady Math Diagnostic has been completed and will be shared with students in order to set goals.

Science: Students are learning to think like an astronomer while studying the solar system and where we fit in. Two compelling questions of discourse: How big is big? How far is far?

Social Studies: Students are going back in time and finding out what made people explore and colonize. When different cultures encountered one another, how did people adapt to a new environment? Did "this period" of exploration change the world? How? Was it better?

Aloha families,

We have been busy here in B2 settling into the new routines. We have been talking about our manners; good manners like saying "good morning" or "good bye", "excuse me" when interrupting someone as well as going around people when they are in the middle of a conversation instead of cutting through the conversation.

In ELA we have been talking about how to make friends or be friends, how do friends and family learn, grow and work together and finally, what makes us special. In the coming month, we will be talking about how families differ and special places and celebrations where they come from. We will also be learning about our senses and how animals move. This past month, we had started putting numbers into groups so that we could start learning about tens and ones. In math we will be talking about representing numbers up to 20, creating groups of objects to look at data. In addition, we will be writing two-digit numbers and exploring the properties of odd and even.

### SEL (Social Emotional Learning) & PE: Mrs. Nguyen

Hello Families!

Social Emotional Learning and Physical Education have been off to a great start. We are so fortunate to have SEL class in the library!

This month we have been working on Self-Awareness and will start to focus on skills to becoming a good learner in school. It is so important that your child gain these skills of how to be a good learner, so she/he knows what successful looks like from the minute they step into their learning environment.

The driving question about self-awareness:

What do I need to know about myself, in order to become good at something?

This month we are focusing on where students come from – their family traditions, experiences, morals, and characteristics. Students are being asked to look at themselves and really reflect on their personal likes/dislikes, strengths/non-strengths, passion/dreams to begin their journey of finding out who they actually are.

In Physical Education all students are working on Locomotor skills: walking, jogging, running, skipping, galloping, side to side (shuffle), hopping, jumping, and leaping. Kindergarten through second grade is continuing to practice these skills, while grade 3 – 5 are being assessed on these skills.

We are continuing to work on our Social Emotional Learning and Physical Activity Journal in class for the first quarter. Please keep actively moving with your child – aim for a family activity like walking, going to the park/beach, or exercising in your house for 60 minutes a day.
