- Students can also complete i-Ready at home. Your child needs at least a total of 50-minutes for both <u>Reading and Math.</u> The more minutes on i-Ready the better.
- M Reading Fluency & Comprehension Homework TIME your child while he/she reads for 1 MINUTE and count the number of words read correctly. Also ask and answer comprehension questions to check for understanding in the story/text.
- See Have your child read everyday for at least 20 minutes. This helps to build reading fluency, comprehension, vocabulary, and spelling skills.

Aloha 3rd Grade Families!




Specials classes are on Wednesdays, please help your child remember to wear socks and shoes, comfortable clothes and to bring a water bottle to help them stay hydrated.




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Computer Science - Mr. Sutherland

In 5th grade computer science, the students are learning about run-length encoding. Run-length encoding is the basic compression algorithm used for FAX machines. This topic introduces data compression, showing how information can be stored and transmitted efficiently. It builds problem-solving skills and computational thinking. Run-length encoding helps them see patterns and optimize processes, useful in technology and daily life. It also prepares them for advanced computer science topics, encouraging critical thinking and curiosity about technology.

Aloha mai kakou,

We kick off the second quarter with MAKAHIKI. Students will learn about Lono and why the Hawaiian people celebrated him during Makahiki. The new year, or Makahiki, was marked when Makali'i (Pleiades) rose in the east while the sun set in the west. Makahiki usually began in mid-November and lasted four month. In the last School Community Council meeting, Mr. Arakaki reviewed ways in which you can support your child at home with their school work. Here are some gentle reminders:

- Make sure they have a quiet place to work
- Check and sign their Planner every day
- Check that they complete their homework daily.
- Check for important papers to sign and return.

If you find that your child is struggling with their homework, please give them as much support as you can without giving them the answers. Let your child's teacher know right away that your child is struggling and be specific with what your child is having difficulty with. Our teachers will be glad to hear your feedback and will be better equipped to help your child when they return to school.

Please be aware of the amount of screen time your child has while at home. Excessive screen time has been linked to negative physical, social, and emotional health and well being in children. Instead of screen time, engage your child with other activities such as reading a book, drawing, playing outside, sports, or other hobbies. Recommended time limits from pediatricians are¹:

- Under 2 years old: Zero screen time, except for video chatting with family or friends
- 2-5 years old: No more than one hour per day co-viewing with a parent or sibling •
- 5-17 years old: Generally no more than two hours per day, except for homework

Did you know that 13 years old is the minimum age for most social media sites? Speaking from personal experience, my son, who is now in college, fought me every step of the way about his screen time. There was a period of time when I didn't recognize him (he was angry, impatient, and sometimes disrespectful) and that scared me. I made him go tech free for 3 weeks and that made such a difference. I got my son back. As he got older, he was better able to monitor himself, but it still took a lot of monitoring, diligence, and consistency from me. But let me tell you, it was worth it. Be strong; try not to take the tantrums and anger personally when you limit your child's screen time and work on changing their screen habits. It will pass. Teach them that it is okay to not be entertained every second of the day; it is okay to sit and be with yourself in your thoughts; it is okay to davdream. Recently, my son thanked me for limiting his time on the screen because he sees how detrimental it was for him growing up. Again, it was so worth it.

English Language Development

ACCESS for ELLs Assessment is just around the corner. The ACCESS testing window is from Jan.13, 2025 - February 28, 2025.

The table below is the revised ACCESS for ELLs Proficiency Cut Score, based on the banded model.

Grade	Overall Proficiency Level of ≥4.7 on the ACCESS for ELLs	Additional Criteria for ELs with an Overall Proficiency Level of 4.5 or 4.6 on the ACCESS for ELLs
K-2	Clear exit	ACCESS for ELLs literacy score of ≥4.7
3-8	Clear exit	Proficient on Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBA) English Language Arts (ELA)
9	Clear exit	Proficient on SBA ELA (using 8th grade scores)
10	Clear exit	ACCESS for ELLs literacy score of ≥4.7
11	Clear exit	Proficient on SBA ELA
12	Clear exit	Proficient on SBA ELA (using 11th grade scores)

The table above summarizes the following:

- Students who achieve a proficiency cut score of ≥4.7 on the ACCESS for ELLs assessment will be automatically eligible for exit from EL program services with no additional criteria (clear exit).
- Students who achieve a proficiency cut score of 4.5 or 4.6 on the ACCESS for ELLs in grades 3-9, grade 11, and grade 12, will also need to demonstrate English Language Arts (ELA) proficiency on the SBA to be eligible for exit from EL program services.
- Students in grades K-2 and grade 10 who score a 4.5 or 4.6 on the ACCESS for ELLs will also need to achieve a literacy score (a composite of their reading and writing domain scores) of ≥4.7 on the ACCESS for ELLs assessment to be eligible for exit from EL program services.

Revised Alternate ACCESS Proficiency Cut Score

The new proficiency cut score for the Alternate ACCESS assessment is ≥P1. Following WIDA's standard setting process in the fall of 2024, a correlated proficiency level has been used. This represents a significant step forward in the Department's efforts to accurately measure the English language proficiency of English Learners (ELs) with significant cognitive disabilities.
