- Please help us in having your child complete their homework each day. Check their planners daily.
- Students can also complete i-Ready at home. Your child needs at least a total of 50 minutes for both Reading and Math. The more minutes on i-Ready the better.
- Reading Fluency & Comprehension Homework TIME your child while he/she reads for 1

  MINUTE and count the number of words read correctly. Also, ask and answer comprehension questions to check for understanding in the story/text.
- Have your child read every day for at least 15 minutes. This helps to build reading fluency, comprehension, vocabulary, and spelling skills.

In this Thanksgiving month, we thank you for being an active partner in your child's education. We are so grateful for your home support. Thank you for your hard work!



#### **Fourth Grade Routines and Expectations**

### Nā Hopena A'o (HĀ)

### Pauoa's Fastest Class Quarter 1 - 2025

Below, you will find the results of each class and where they stand.

#### **Fastest Class Competition Rules**

Each class was given 4 minutes to run laps around the court, with the course marked by cones on the big field. During this time, a counter kept track of the total number of laps completed by each student.

At the end of the 4 minutes, the total number of laps run by all students in the class was divided by the total number of students who participated that day. This provides an average score for the class.

#### **Example:**

If a class of 20 students ran a total of 130 laps in the 4-minute period, the total laps (130) would be divided by the number of students (20), resulting in an average score of **6.5 laps per student**.

Now that the students have a better understanding of how to improve their scores, we're hoping to see increased motivation and higher average scores in future competitions.

Let's continue to encourage our students to push themselves and give their best effort!

### Computer Science - Mr. Sutherland

Aloha,

In Computer Science, Pauoa students have been learning about pixels and how they form the foundation of every digital image. A pixel is the smallest unit of a picture on a screen, and when many pixels come together, they create the photos, videos, and games we see everyday.

To explore this idea, students created their own pixel art. They planned their designs on grids, chose colors carefully, and saw how changing just one pixel can affect the whole image. Through this creative process, they learned that computer graphics are built from data, where each pixel is represented by numbers that describe its color and position.

Understanding pixels helps students make connections to how computers store and process information, how images are compressed, and how coding languages handle visual data. This activity builds a foundation for future learning in computer science, digital art, and even robotics, where sensors and screens rely on similar ideas.
